Incentivising Excellence – Academic Standards EPC Annual Congress 13 April 2010

- In current QAA audit methodology, 'Academic standards' describe the level of achievement that a student has to reach to gain an award (for example, a degree).
- 'Academic quality' is a way of describing how well the learning opportunities available to students help them to achieve their award.
- Institutions themselves are responsible for managing and maintaining quality and standards. QAA conducts an external review to provide public assurance that institutions are doing this effectively; we also have an enhancement role and share good practice across the sector.
- Current arrangements are based on fundamental recognition of autonomy and independence of HEIs but recognising the need to safeguard the public interest in the standards and quality of HE.
- The Academic Infrastructure is a nationally agreed set of reference points which give all institutions a shared starting point for setting, describing and assuring the quality and standards of their higher education courses. It is currently under evaluation. There are four components:
 - 1. The frameworks for higher education qualifications (FHEQs).
 - 2. The Code of Practice.
 - 3. Subject benchmark statements.
 - 4. Programme specifications.
- Challenges in assuring academic standards:
 - o Criticism that QAA doesn't monitor standards directly.
 - Desire for direct comparability of standards.
- Future direction as set out in *Higher Ambitions:*
 - o Students need to play a greater role in assuring standards and quality.
 - Reviewing and developing complaints procedure to ensure responsiveness to serious concerns.
 - Students need
 - a) to be aware of QAA and that it assures standards, and
 - b) better quality information to help inform their choices.
- Challenge to QAA to improve its public engagement: by reforming QAA's communication we will raise awareness about academic standards and quality, and their importance in sustaining excellence.
- Four national reviews will have major impact on future quality system:
 - Review of audit method for England and N.I.
 - Review of external examining.
 - Development of set of public information to be published by HEIs.
 - Review of Academic Infrastructure.
