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
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ICE context

- 80,000 members worldwide
- 20,000 student members worldwide
- History of decline in student numbers in previous recessions followed by skills shortages in recovery.
- 2012-2013: 10224 ICE student members on courses at 'JBM accredited' universities.
- This represents 55.21% of all students on accredited courses.
- An additional 1064 student members in FE/nonaccredited i.e. 9% of student membership

UCAS and arrivals

- 8010 UCAS applicants shake down into 4676+ arriving (supplemented by part time applicants and overseas students not necessarily applying though UCAS).
- Reasons cited for the decline in numbers by universities include:
 - a rush to apply before fees increased, estimated by Cambridge to have resulted in 6% recruitment above target for 2011 and 6% below for 2012.
 - the recession, particularly affecting part-time numbers on IEng degrees, with employers reducing training budgets.
 - recession in Ireland significantly affecting recruitment in Northern Ireland.
 - visa issues numbers of overseas students are buoyant so far but a number of universities report students being turned down unexpectedly while others have only been granted visas when it has been too late to start.
 - AAB (Now ABB) and quotas having some effect. Some universities that could have recruited through clearing decided to reduce staff-student numbers for quality reasons.
 - there are fewer 18 year olds no upturn in numbers until 2020.
 - apprentices entering at L3 probably comprise 8% of all entrants all levels



Summary

- Total numbers in universities are still relatively healthy and cohorts graduating seem likely to be relatively stable in the short term even allowing for attrition.
- There has been an overall increase in the numbers studying at Levels 4 and 5 on Foundation Degree provision particularly, but individual institutions report decline in PT numbers.
- Numbers on MSc programmes have increased this is partly explained by a rise in numbers of overseas students.
- Universities remain vulnerable to the vagaries of student visa controls. MSc provision is especially vulnerable. Some universities are heavily reliant on students from particular countries such as India and China to maintain specialist course provision.


ICE student members (overseas studying at UK JBM institutions)
